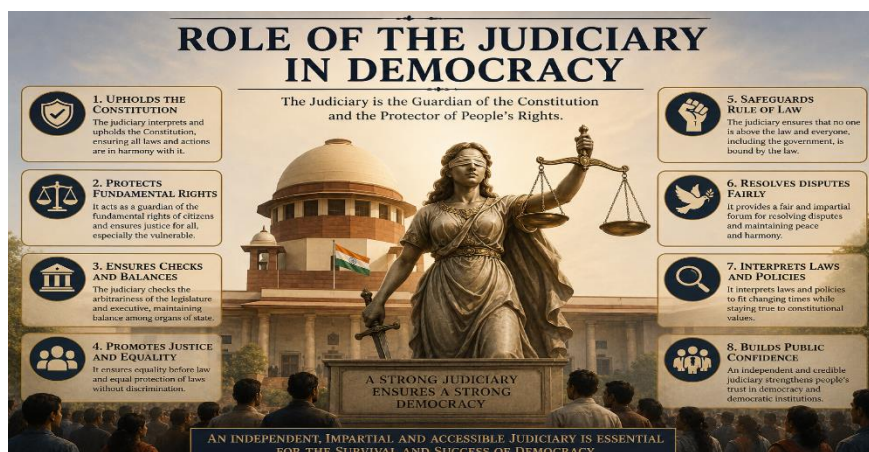


Role of the Judiciary in Democracy

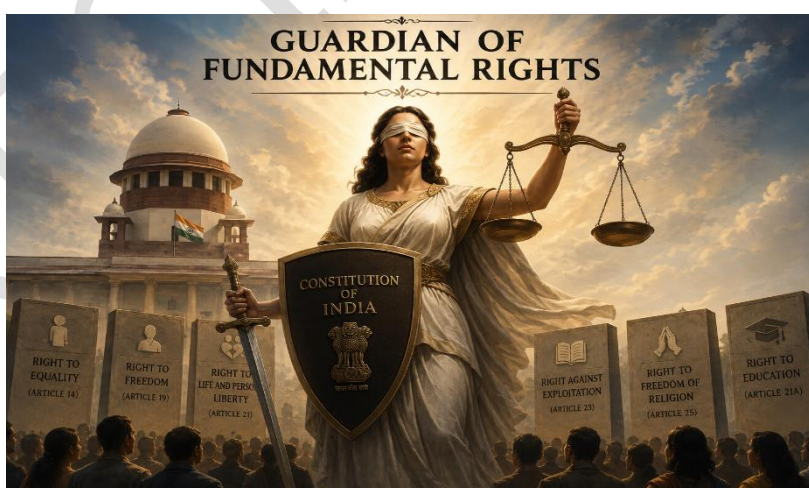


The judiciary acts as the ultimate guardian of a democracy, serving as the backbone that keeps the system fair, free, and functional.

Here is a look at the essential roles the judiciary plays in keeping democracy alive.

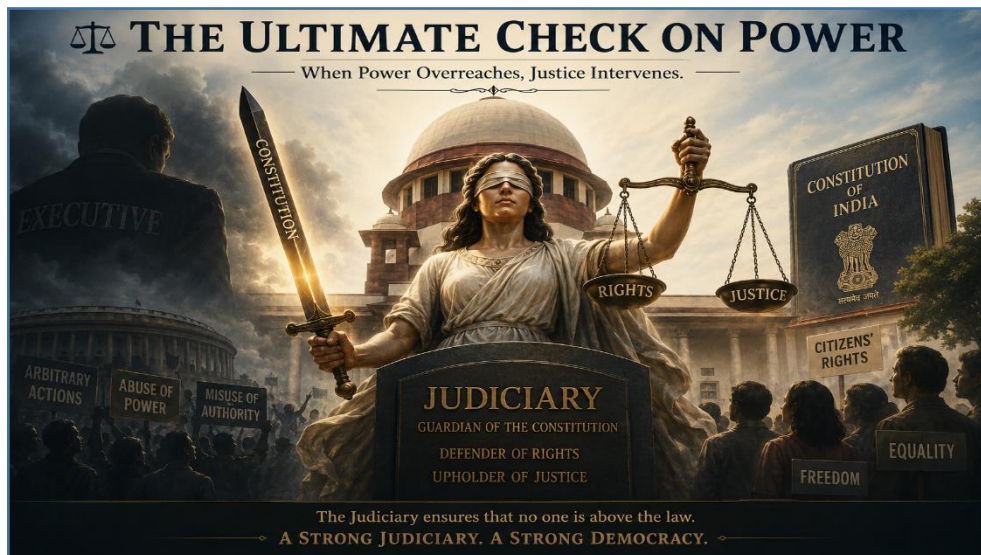
🛡️ Guardian of Fundamental Rights



The judiciary is the shield that protects ordinary citizens from the misuse of power. If a government passes a law or takes an action that violates your freedom of speech, privacy, or equality, the courts have the power to step in. Through mechanisms like constitutional writs, citizens can appeal directly

to the courts to restore their violated rights, ensuring that the majority cannot easily trample over the minority.

⚖️ The Ultimate Check on Power



Power has a natural tendency to expand, and without a watchdog, governments can lean toward authoritarianism. The judiciary holds the power of **judicial review**. This means courts can examine the laws passed by parliament and the actions taken by the prime minister or president. If these actions cross constitutional boundaries, the judiciary can declare them null and void. It forces the rulers to follow the exact same rules as the ruled.

⚖️ Arbiter of Disputes



A democracy cannot thrive in chaos. Whether it is a property dispute between two neighbours, a commercial battle between giant corporations, or a massive disagreement between state governments and the central government, the judiciary provides a peaceful, structured arena to resolve conflicts.
